Description: Individual and Team tournament – 36 holes

Class division

- ❖ Men

- ❖ 3 individual handicap classes covering handicap range 0 36.

General

- 1. The tournament will be played over two rounds of 18 holes
- 2. Two courses will be used during the tournament The Dunes course and the Bay course
- 3. Players will be split evenly over the two courses over the two days

Scoring Classes

- 1. Gross scoring (women and men separately)
- 2. Net stableford scoring classes:
- Class A (e. g. handicap up to 14.4)
- Class B (e. g. handicap 14.5 to -25.4)
- Class C (e. g. handicap 25.5 to -36.0)

Rules

- 1. The final score is an accumulation of all daily scores.
- 2. Women and men are evaluated separately.
- 3. Prizes are awarded to the three best placed women and the three best placed men in each scoring class. Individual double prizes are not permissible. Prize winners in the gross scoring class are not eligible for prizes in their net scoring classes.



PROCLAMATION

- 4. For the team competition the net scores (women or men) of 3 individual company team players which have to be nominated before the start of the tournament are cumulated each day (multi-company teams are not allowed).
- 5. Unless otherwise specified, the rules of the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews (R & A) apply.
- 6. Each competitor starts with his current handicap, which is confirmed immediately prior to the tournament in writing by his club. Failure to produce confirmation will result in a starting handicap of zero.
- 7. Scoring will be carried out for handicaps up to -36, which is the lowest official handicap in Europe.
- 8. The tournament will be declared as a qualification for handicap.
- 9. The referees/stewards must be consistent with international rulings.
